REFLECTIONS: *When Someone Is Gone*

It was one of those rare times at our house when there was only one child around. Stevie's older sisters were off at camps and on mission trips, so it was a good time for a father-son airport outing.

We had just left McDonald's and were on our way to visit the cockpit of a DC-9 when Stevie surprised me. After I said, "This is fun, isn't it?" he replied, almost sadly, "Yeah, but it's not as much fun without Melissa."

I figured his mind would be filled with thoughts of airplanes and burgers, so for him to think about his 8-year-old sister was unexpected.

His sentiment reminded me of how significant our loved ones are to us. When they're away, our activities can't make us stop thinking of them and wishing they were with us. That truth has special significance if we have loved ones who have died. The loss of their companionship is painful. Life is not the same without them.

In our sadness, though, God comforts us with the promise of 1 Thessalonians 4, which tells us that we do not need to "sorrow as others who have no hope" (v.13). We can look forward to the time when Jesus returns and we will be reunited with our believing loved ones. That truth is a big comfort when someone is gone.-JDB

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At the Cemetery

He who believes in Me, though he may die, he shall live. —John 11:25

When a loved one dies and we go to the cemetery, we may join a long processional. We may sit or stand around the gravesite and listen respectfully while the priest commits the body to the earth and reads Bible verses about the resurrection. Then the casket is lowered into the ground. We may return later to leave some flowers and stand with heads bowed in memory and respect. Our loved one is dead, and we know we can never bring him back.

When Jesus went to the cemetery, it was different. His friend Lazarus had died, and when Jesus got to the tomb, He exercised His power and authority. He commanded: "Take away the stone" (John 11:39). "Lazarus, come forth!" (v.43). "Loose him, and let him go" (v.44).

We might wish with all our hearts that we could bring a loved one back, but if we were to give those commands nothing would happen. But Jesus has that ability, for He is "the resurrection and the life" (v.25). His power was demonstrated when Lazarus came out of the tomb—alive!

One day, Jesus will again be "at the cemetery." And when He gives the command, all the dead who believed in Him will "come forth" (John 5:28-29; 1 Thessalonians 4:16). What a day that will be! — Dave Egner

From the Director's Desk

As summer draws to an end, it seems like the only thing that has not grown weary of the drought and heat are the weeds. Like the inhabitants of the Sunshine State, they just love the hot and humid weather. Lawns that looked so promising in the springtime now have been taken over by so many varieties of weeds that the ryegrass and the fescues and the bluegrass are lost in a sea of these invaders. The lawns of the cemeteries face the same battle, and we look forward to some cooler weather when we can once again enjoy the upper hand.

Recently, a news item flashed across the screen of the news channel I was watching. Usually these are not pleasant items, bombings and deaths in the Middle East, shootings, kidnappings and missing persons at home, plane crashes or natural disasters. Yet the wording of this particular item and the follow-up story caught my attention. The President of Pakistan and the Prime Minister of India, countries divided by decades of war, distrust and religious differences, issued a joint statement that said in part, "conscious of the historic opportunity created by the improved relations and the overwhelming desire of the peoples of the two countries for a durable peace...determined that the peace process was now irreversible." The last part of that statement contained words that one does not usually see or hear in the same sentence. We hear about war being inevitable, but to read that the peace process was now "irreversible" was certainly refreshing, especially considering the years of strife the peoples of these two nations have been through. Though I'm sure that there will continue to be pitfalls in this process, there was public acknowledgement by the leaders of these two nations that the desire for peace was so strong that the barriers to a mutual agreement would be overcome.

For those who have suffered the death of a family member, the peace of the spirit may seem as an elusive goal. The feeling of loss, loneliness, anger, guilt and all the other emotions that present themselves at time of death of a loved one may seem so overwhelming that the thought that there could ever again be peace in our lives may seem impossible.

In the Book of Ecclesiastes (and for those of us who grew up in the 1960's from its adaptation into a folk-rock tune) we are reminded that there is a time for every season: "A time to reap, a time to sow, a time for war, a time for peace." I recently heard this reading at a funeral Mass, and what struck me was the inspired words the author used for those in sorrow: "A time to mourn, a time to dance." We aren't told that there is a time to mourn and a time to be glad; the author brings us all the way from mourning to dancing, the ultimate expression of joy and happiness. What a far-reaching journey we have to bring us from that one extreme to the other!

Don't be hard on yourself if you're only part way along in this journey. Know that others are there with you, and seek their help and support. Pray that God will give you strength and guidance, and know that our Lord's promise of a peace beyond all understanding awaits you. Peace be with you.

Stainless Steel Portraits

On March 16, 2005 – The Diocese of Rockville Centre Office of Catholic Cemeteries announced a new memorial portrait program which will allow stainless steel portraits as a new personalization option for most burial spaces at the three Diocesan Catholic Cemeteries.

Available in color or black and white, the portraits are created by converting an original photograph into a digital format. The digitized image is then "burned" into stainless steel. Catholic Cemeteries in cooperation with its memorial suppliers offers state-of-the-art image transfer technology and the maximum color retention of stainless steel to ensure beautiful and long-lasting results. Examples of color and black and white stainless steel memorial portraits are on display at the cemetery offices.

Digital technology enables a wide variety of choices in the creation of the portrait, including a choice of color backgrounds. Catholic Cemeteries can also combine two individual photographs (such as husband and wife) to create a double-portrait image. Conversely, a double image can be separated to create one or two stainless-steel images. Attire can also be modified to create a more dignified image. Size of the oval portrait is dependent on the memorial on which it is to be installed. The maximum portrait size is 3½" by 4¼".



The memorial portrait program is the latest in a series of customization options available at Catholic Cemeteries. Other personalization options include: memorial kiosk and monument etching.

For nearly fifteen years, located in each Catholic Cemetery, the memorial kiosk is a computerized interment directory that enables the inclusion of an image and biography of the deceased.

Images are also etched into cemetery monuments. A traditional photograph is digitized and then the image is etched into the granite gravesite monument by computerized etching machines. This option offers personalization of a monument without sacrificing generational integrity.

Holiday Decoration Program

Catholic Cemeteries will again offer a holiday decoration program. For those families who have gravesites, the Christmas program affords the opportunity to purchase an evergreen blanket or pillow, while the Easter Program offers a palm cross for placement on individual graves.

We will continue to decorate the chapels in our mausoleums with poinsettias at Christmas and lilies at Easter. All families, especially those who have entombments in our Crypts, are invited to purchase a plant in memory of a loved one. The name of the deceased will be listed in a memorial book placed in each of the chapels.

There is an inherent need to remember those you have loved in a special way and, hopefully, we can provide you with such an opportunity.

At Holy Rood, Holy Sepulchre, and Queen of All Saints Cemeteries, during the Saturday Mass on **December 3rd**, family members will be invited to place an ornament on our Christmas trees in memory of their loved ones. You are invited to bring an ornament with you to be placed there during the offertory procession. Please remember that our chapels are public places, so we recommend an ornament that can be easily replaced, if necessary. The ornaments will remain on the trees throughout the Christmas season and can be picked up any day from January 1st through January 10th.

Candle Lighting Service

It has been said that a *cemetery is for the living*. Although it's true that a Catholic Cemetery is the final resting place of the mortal bodies that were temples of the Holy Spirit until the Lord comes in glory, it is also a place where we, the living, come to remember those we love who have gone before us. It is a place where we come soon after the funeral filled with sadness and loneliness.

In time, however, we come to the awareness that the cemetery is a place of comfort; we live in the hope that those we love are safe and secure in the Lord. We are also comforted in the simple act of remembering our loved ones, as the visit to the cemetery renews a bond we know can never be broken.

On **Sunday, October 30th**, we will have an opportunity to remember, in a special way, those we love that are interred in Catholic Cemeteries. **Beginning at 3:00 PM at Holy Rood Cemetery**, the Diocesan Choir will preside over a ceremony of prayer, song and remembrance. All will participate in a candle lighting ceremony at which time those who were interred since **November 1st 2004** will be remembered by name.

Queen of Peace Cemetery?

***Finding new Burial Space for
Roman Catholics in Nassau County.***

Since 1995, the Diocese has been seeking approval from the Village of Old Westbury for cemetery use of ninety-seven acres of land it owns on Jericho Turnpike. The Diocese pursued the matter in the courts, and the Appellate Division affirmed the Diocese's contention that the use of the property is religious and must be accommodated under the New York State Constitution. In recent months, the Diocese has presented the site plan phase by presenting plans to the Village. The new plan attempts to address the concerns of the residents by reducing the cemetery size and subdividing the remaining acreage into building lots. By doing this, no current property owner will be immediately adjacent to the cemetery and the building lots will remain on the tax roles. Entrance to the cemetery will be restricted to Jericho Turnpike. Since cemetery traffic does not coincide with peak traffic hours, we are confident that this six lane divided state highway is more than sufficient to handle the additional traffic pattern with little impact.

Death separates us for a time; Christ will reunite us forever.

A Dedication for Remembrance and Healing!

Ever since the tragedy that occurred on September 11, 2001, it has been the intention of the Catholic Cemeteries of the Diocese of Rockville Centre to erect a memorial to call to mind the event that will be forever etched in our memory and will remain a part of our national psyche. Since that day, we have worked to provide a place in one of our local Catholic Cemeteries where the names of those who died would be memorialized and where their families could come for remembrance and meditation. As one people in Christ's body, whose membership does not expire with death, we hope our cemeteries provide a place to renew faith and affirm hope in the resurrection and the eternal mercy of God.

The memorial was erected in the small section of land that had been set aside for the victims in Holy Rood Cemetery in Westbury. The central feature of the memorial is a bronze replica of Michelangelo's Pieta which was blessed on Memorial Day 2004. The firm from which it was purchased owns the plaster copy taken from the mold of the original masterpiece. The replica is cast using the lost wax technology and is as close as you can get to the original masterpiece by Michelangelo. As a background for the statue, there is a large cruciform shape of black granite on which is inscribed the names and occupations of those who died on September 11th as requested by their family. (This was done at no cost to the families, but required the permission of the next of kin.) The inscription of the names on a massive piece of black granite is a powerful image of lasting memorialization. The two structures are joined together in a stone-paved plaza, uniting the memory of those who died with the redemptive death of the Saviour Lord. It also provides a place of peace, meditation and consolation to all families. Bishop Murphy blessed the memorial on All Souls Day, November 2, 2004, in conjunction with the cemetery field Mass.

Although the memorial is already installed, additional names of the victims of September 11th have been and continue to be added and inscribed on site. Also, the cemetery continues to offer memorials in the stone pavers placed within the plaza for those interested in a special memorial. We received donations from more than 1200 families to help defray the cost.



Additional copies of the Dedication Service brochure may be requested and picked up in person at the Holy Rood office.

Some interesting facts about our memorial:

- How many names have been inscribed: 404
- What do the inscriptions say: The deceased's name and occupation where requested
- Where are these burial sites: Some are several feet away from this memorial; others are throughout Holy Rood, Holy Sepulchre and Queen of All Saints' cemeteries, and in parish and other cemeteries in our area. Many names are inscribed in memory of those whose remains have not yet been recovered.
- The statue is an exact replica in bronze of Michelangelo's famous statue.
- The black granite wall is 10 1/2 feet tall and 8 feet wide. It is cut from one piece of black granite in a cruciform shape that stands on the base totaling 12-feet in height.
- The stone paver memorials placed have been etched IN MEMORY OF deceased or DONATED BY families and friends who wish to contribute to the memorial.

From the Director's Desk

Tsunami: It's a word that many had never heard before, and certainly one that was not used in ordinary every-day conversation. All that changed in the events of December 26th, when in a matter of moments, over 200,000 lives were lost in the earthquake and resulting displacement of trillions of tons of water. A wall of water rushed outward at a speed of 500 miles an hour, spending its energy only when it reached land. Once it did, its force destroyed homes, hotels, trains, anything in its path, which in this case reached South Asia, Indonesia, India and even parts of Africa. Whole villages, communities, vacation resorts and maybe even cultures were destroyed in the blink of an eye.

Seeing the sorrow, the pain and the suffering, the question that immediately makes us wonder: How can God let this happen... entire families lost, children swept from their parent's arms, a trainload of people killed in an instant?

Yet that is not unlike the question asked at the death of anyone we love, especially if it was sudden and unexpected. What have I done to deserve this, why have I been left alone, why do bad things happen to good people?

Some religious commentators talked about the sinfulness of the world and God punishing it. Quite frankly, the stark video of the young child playing on the beach and being swept away by the force of the wave makes me wonder how anyone could believe that God, in His infinite wisdom and mercy, chose to take the life of that child as punishment for sin.

We are human, and subject to all human frailties. As Christians, our belief is that God became human in the Incarnation, and that our Lord chose to suffer and die to bring us to new life. His death did not protect us from suffering, for if there were no suffering, we would not be human. But we also believe that the pain of this world is temporary, and that the love of Christ conquers even death itself.

This belief, as sure and certain as we are in the hope of the resurrection and the ceaseless joy that awaits those who die, does not lessen the pain we feel at the loss of someone we have loved. Just as Jesus wept upon learning of the death of his friend Lazarus, our tears are our human reaction to pain and loss.

In the prayers that are said at the Rite of Committal, the minister prays: "Grant that our brother/sister may sleep here in peace until you beckon him/her to glory, for you are the resurrection and the life. Then he/she will see you face to face and in your light will see light and know the splendor of God." And at the time of Final Commendation, we pray: "May the love of God and the peace of the Lord Jesus Christ bless and console us and gently wipe every tear from our eyes."

At the Catholic Cemeteries, we offer a place to remember and to mourn, while at the same time ever mindful of the promise of our Lord. Whether by a quiet visit to the gravesite, a time of quiet meditation in the chapel, or participation in the monthly Masses or other religious services throughout the year, we live the hope of the resurrection and pray for the peace of God which is beyond all understanding.

Planting Regulations

As warm weather approaches, we would like to remind you about the planting regulations. In monument sections, annual flowers such as geraniums, begonias, impatiens and marigolds may be planted in a bed that can extend 1' in front of the monument. Bouquets of fresh flowers are permitted in monument sections in vases that are ground level, and in shrine sections in the vase that is part of the bronze memorial. No glass vases, staties or other breakable items are permitted as they could cause injuries to employees as they are maintaining the grounds. **As a reminder - items placed in violation of the planting and decorating rules and items damaged unrightly or out of season are often removed and disposed of in accordance with stated policies.** Potted plants are permitted for holidays. All holiday decorations will be picked up on the following dates:
